Acknowledgement of Country

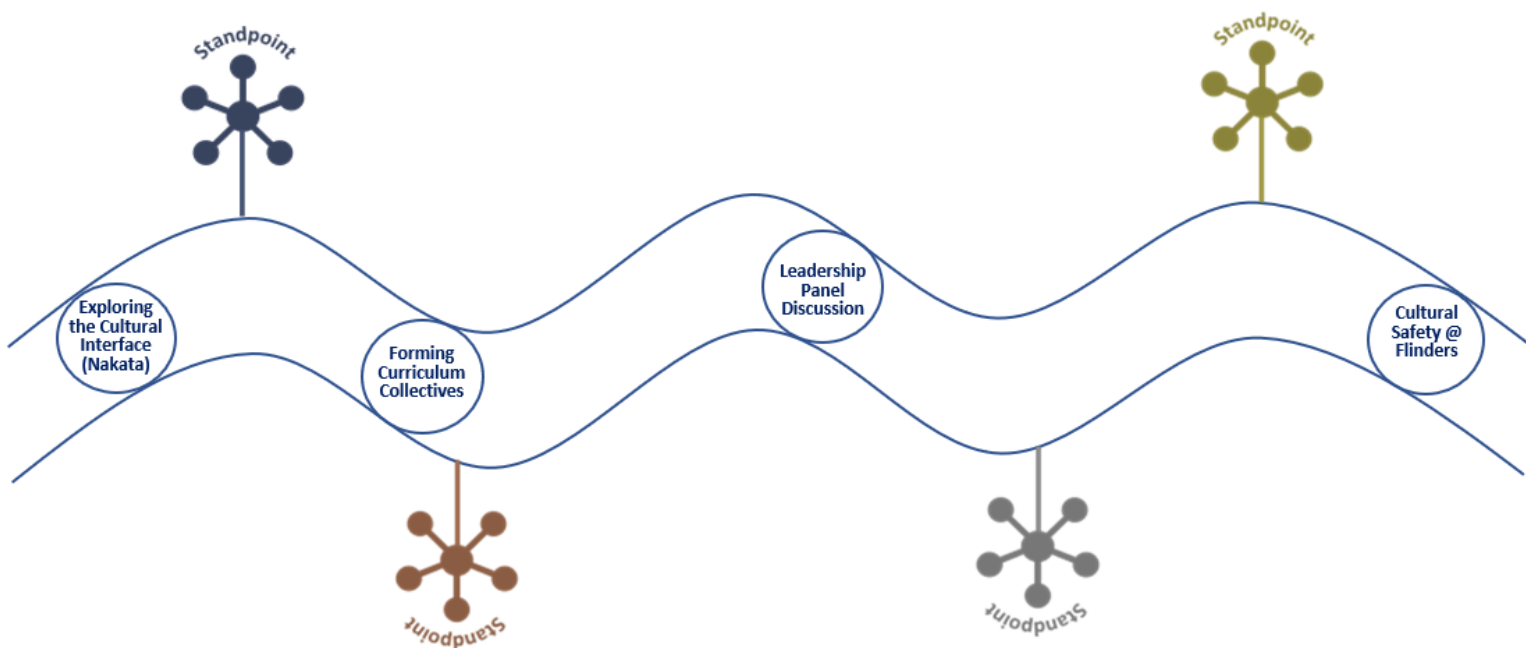
